CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

I am pleased to present the Chief Executive's report as part of the Friends, Families and Travellers (FFT) Annual Report 2024.

This year has seen significant milestones in our mission to promote the rights and improve the lives of Gypsy, Roma, and Traveller communities across the UK.

Continuing to provide advocacy and casework support at a local and national level, this year, our incredible Service Delivery team helped Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people with over 4300 issues ranging from access to justice, to accommodation resolution, to tackling digital exclusion.

In fact, we helped distribute over 90,000GB worth of data, and supporting more people to access online services.

At a national level, we are aggrieved that people living on roadside camps and itinerant Boaters were excluded from energy support grants, but we're also extremely heartened to know that our political campaigning led to over 10,000 Gypsy and Traveller households accessing more than £3.5 million in support.

Over the past few years, we've been battling anti-Traveller legislation in the courts, and I'm extremely proud to lead a team that persuaded the Supreme Court to declare anti-Traveller wide injunctions as having a "negative impact on the ability to pursue a nomadic way of life".

Not only that, but the notorious Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Act 2022 was dealt a devastating blow by Wendy Smith, a Romany Gypsy, as well as FFT and our legal team, in partnership with human rights giants Liberty, when a High Court judge ruled that the Act's extension of the power to ban Gypsies and Travellers from an area from 3 to 12 months was in breach of the European Convention on Human Rights.

Our amazing youth work continues to go from strength to strength, breaking down barriers and inspiring the next generation of Gypsy and Traveller activists, with away days to the Houses of Parliament to see how laws are created, as well as mock trials where the young people acted out all the different roles in a court!

I have been deeply moved by the openness and generosity shown by Gypsy and Traveller families up and down the country, with donations pouring in as part of our Season's Giftings campaign. Through your support, we're extremely proud to have been able to provide over 50 families across Sussex food, toys and gas bottles to spread a little bit of Christmas cheer– our Favourite Moment of the year!

I'd like to extend a huge thanks to our wonderful staff team, Trustees, and volunteers for their hard work and unparalleled passion and commitment, day in day out.

Together with you, our supporters, we hope to continue our positive impact on the lives of Gypsy, Roma, and Traveller people, families and communities. In fact, I hope that one day our services will not be needed at all.



Financial Impact




Through FFT, we helped give out more than £109,000 in grants to our beneficiaries, to help make daily life a little easier

SUPPORTING NEEDS

Romany Gypsies, Roma and Irish Travellers face some of the poorest health and education outcomes of any minority ethnic groups in the UK, contributing to a cycle of inequality made up of barriers embedded in daily life.

These same barriers can also affect nomadic groups, such as New Traveller, Showmen and Boater communities.

To tackle the root causes on the frontline, our Service Delivery Team delivered workshops, increased training and employability opportunities for young people, and provided free healthcare information and advice to families.

IMPROVING FINANCIAL INCLUSION

Improving access to opportunities and reducing the risk of economic and financial exclusion, our Service Delivery Team launched a Young People Employment programme, to support FFT's work towards helping young people's transition into education, training or employment.

RAISING AWARENESS THROUGH RESEARCH

We released a series of briefings outlining the barriers Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people face across <u>education</u>, <u>maternal</u> <u>health</u>, <u>race hate and prejudice</u>, and <u>economic exclusion</u>, to widen understanding of the issues faced and to help improve people's life chances.

WORKING WITH OTHERS TO HIGHLIGHT DISCRIMINATION

Supported by FFT, a national survey led by the Centre on the Dynamics of Ethnicity, with the largest number of Gypsy and Traveller respondents to date, <u>exposed the racism and</u> <u>discrimination Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people face</u>.

MAKING SPACE FOR YOUNG GYPSIES AND TRAVELLERS

Facilitated by our Service Delivery Team, the UK Parliament Education Centre took young Gypsies and Travellers on a tour of Parliament, giving young people an opportunity to see how politics impacts day-to-day life, how laws are created, and to experience an environment that is often considered out of reach.



GIVING SEASON

Our <u>Season's Giftings campaign</u> was launched for the second year running! Thanks to everyone's support, 50 Gypsy and Traveller families across Sussex received toys, food, or a gas bottle, ending the year on a high and helping us spread festive cheer.

HEALTH EQUALITY

To tackle health inequalities in Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities, our Service Delivery Team facilitated a range of workshops on the importance of healthy eating, and enrolled more young Gypsies and Travellers onto our award-winning <u>Young Health Champions Programme</u>, to support them in cascading health messages to peers and family.



CHALLENGING LAWS AND POLICIES

FIGHTING INJUSTICE IN THE COURTS

We fought the use of anti-Traveller wide injunctions in the Supreme Court, where a judge recognised that wide injunctions have a "*negative impact on the ability to pursue a nomadic way of life*", severely restricting the use of the injunctions.

We're grateful for the incredible work of Chris Johnson of <u>Community Law Partnership</u> (CLP), Marc Willers KC, Tessa Buchanan and Owen Greenhall of <u>Garden Court</u> <u>Chambers</u>, and Richard Drabble KC of <u>Landmark Chambers</u>.

CALLING TIME ON THE POLICE ACT 2022

With FFT and Liberty as Interveners, Wendy Smith, a Romany Gypsy, challenged the new police powers under the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Act 2022 in the High Court. In a landmark decision, the judge ruled that the extension of the power to ban Gypsies and Travellers from an area from 3 to 12 months under the Act was in breach of the European <u>Convention on Human Rights</u>, limiting its impact on the nomadic way of life.







PONTINS BLACKLISTED

We gave evidence to the Equality and Human Rights Commission's (EHRC) investigation into Pontins Holiday Parks, which was found to have acted unlawfully against Irish Travellers for operating a 'blacklist' of common Irish names. If Pontins fail to adhere to the recommendations set out by the EHRC, the operator could face criminal sanctions, acting as a warning to others who choose to hold hostile policies against Gypsy and Traveller people.

ADDRESSING SITE PROVISION

As part of the <u>Oak Project</u>, we released a new report looking at the planning system's approach to Gypsy and Traveller sites from 1960 to 2023, using the past to create a blueprint for the future.

The report explores how we can dismantle barriers across accommodation provision so Gypsy and Traveller families have somewhere to call home.

CULTURES

WEAVING JOURNEYS: A CELEBRATION OF GYPSY, ROMA AND TRAVELLER LIVES, HISTORIES AND CULTURES

Our theme for Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month (GRTHM) 2023 was '<u>Weaving Journeys:</u> <u>A celebration of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller lives,</u> <u>histories and cultures'</u>.

We featured stories of cherished stopping places, beloved textile patterns, and a family pack of beautiful A3 posters and sticker packs!

The theme encouraged people and families to share stories and discuss histories, and many even passed along the maps they created!

TRAVELLING TALES

This year, we launched a new project <u>Travelling Tales</u>, which saw our Vardo converted into a micro museum and storytelling space, filled with beautiful artefacts created, donated, and procured by Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people from across the country.

The Vardo had residencies at seven libraries, where we also ran a series of craft workshops and held evening events.

In total, more than 10,000 people saw our Vardo, with many experiencing aspects of Romany, Roma and Traveller cultures for the first time!



We continue to deliver meaningful projects for long-term change

KUSHTI COLLABORATIVE

This project brought Gypsies and Travellers together for a variety of community-led workshops, ranging from rose painting to silver smithing to health engagements, and empowered over 130 community members to have positive experiences through wider participation, boosting wellbeing, increasing confidence and self-esteem.

INFANT FEEDING

Our <u>Health and Wellbeing Alliance</u> project on infant feeding focused on issues experienced by Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people. We produced a report of the results and recruited a Healthcare Professional Steering Group and a Community Steering Group, as another lever towards reducing health inequalities and ultimately bettering the life chances of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities.

ENERGY GRANTS

At the start of the <u>energy crisis</u>, FFT and our supporters fought hard to ensure Gypsies and Travellers were able to access the same financial support as other households in the UK. Official figures confirmed that over 10,000 Gypsy and Traveller households had then been able to access government energy grants, totalling a sum of over £3.5 million.

GYPSY ROMA TRAVELLER FRIENDLY CHURCHES

Launched by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, the <u>Gypsy Roma Traveller Friendly Churches</u> project is a non-denominational scheme across the country to foster greater involvement by Christian churches and their congregations in providing support, shelter and stopping places. Chaplains have been appointed for the communities and the Archbishop of York has become the scheme's patron.

BARROW CADBURY CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM PROJECT

This project explores the impact of the Criminal Justice System (CJS) on Gypsy, Roma and Traveller young adults and their families. The project started with the establishment of a steering group made up of community members and a series of prison visits, creating a pathway between people's experiences and national conversations. With the project due to end in 2025, we seek to disrupt the 'cradle-to-grave' CJS pipeline that many community members are disproportionately thrown into.


